 A very clever composite of three different images that was both visually striking and very poignant






3rd Place.....

WILDLIFE UPDATE

In what must be one of the strangest years we are going through it is wonderful to know that nature is carrying on regardless. As difficult as the year has been, the upside is that many more people had the chance to notice nature and were able to appreciate all the benefits it gives us. We really do have an incredible Natural Health Service.

On the Estate, Covid19 meant that we had to suspend our annual wildlife surveys to keep everyone safe and well. However, from June, breeding bird surveys started again, although other surveys were suspended until next year as important parts of the survey seasons had been missed and the data wouldn't have been comprehensive. The only data I have at present is our terrestrial breeding bird data and that shows a slight decline in the number of breeding species on the Estate down to 17. Encouragingly though this did include breeding Kingfisher and Cuckoo. Our House Martin numbers were low this year and this reflects anecdotal evidence from across the UK for this year. In April this year huge numbers of martins, swallows and swifts were found dead in the streets of Greece after a huge storm. It is thought this storm, plus long term declines, were the causes of low numbers of these birds in the UK this year. Let's hope next year is better. You can help our House martins by leaving their nests in place over winter so that after their mammoth 'commute' from Africa in the spring, they will just have some renovations to do, rather than complete rebuilds.



WILDLIFE NEWS – cont'd

Covid also meant that we were unable to get the Sand martin boxes on Somerford Lagoon completed in time for the spring arrivals. Works are ongoing to finalise these for next spring. It can often take a few years for the birds to find and use these nest boxes, so please keep everything crossed.

You may have seen earlier in the year that the beavers living wild on the River Otter in Devon were granted permission to stay. It is hoped that this may in time lead to more beavers being allowed to live freely across the country. Since 2005 our beavers helped establish many other populations of beavers in enclosures across the UK and ours have done a great job of managing and enhancing Flagham Fen. The few beavers we now have are busy at this time of year, making their lodge sound for winter, and collecting small twigs which they store in underwater 'larders', making feeding easier in the cold winter months.

As we move towards winter you may be thinking about maintenance jobs to your properties. If you are doing repairs to roofs, or planning works to attics (incl. ceiling replacements) etc, please request a short document from the Estate Office that details both yours and the building contractors legal obligations regarding bats. Roosts are protected whether bats are present at the time or not.



WILDLIFE NEWS - cont'd

Activities that can impact on bats at any time of the year include, renovating, converting or demolishing a building; repairing or replacing a roof; replacing cladding/repointing brickwork; insulating or converting a loft; installing lighting in a roost, or outside if it lights up the entrance to the roost; using insecticides or treating timber.

The UK is home to around 12.5 million wintering waterbirds that come from Scandinavia, Northern Europe and Russia to spend winter in the UK where it is warmer and easier to find food over the winter months. However, in recent years, warmer winters have meant that these waterbirds are arriving in the UK in lower numbers and/or are overwintering in new areas. Nonetheless, the Estate is still welcoming a wide range of wintering waterbirds including Coot, Great crested grebe, Wigeon & Tufted duck. Last winter we also recorded good numbers of Goldeneye and other interesting species were Pintail, Snipe, Great white egret, Greylag goose and Goosander. Somerford Lagoon, Freeth Mere and Flagham Fen are strongholds on the Estate for these waterbirds. Hopefully you will get to spot some of these lovely winter visitors over the next few months.




Within a short drive from Lower Mill, Hawkwood College, just outside Stroud


LMEHA -owner reviews cont'd

Message from Davina Stirland at the Cotswold Water Park Trust Take time to explore...

The Cotswold Water Park covers an area of 42 square miles and has over 170 lakes. Take time to explore and wherever you go in the Water Park, take your binoculars with you. There is a huge variety of birds visiting and living in the area throughout the year. During the summer months, admire the aerial antics of hobbies as they hunt dragonflies, look for bats skimming the lake surface for flies at dusk, seek out the magical carpet of wildflowers and watch the clouds of blue damselflies near the lake edges.

If you are a regularly out and about within the Water Park then we would encourage you to join the Cotswold Water Park Trust. Not only will you be helping to make a real difference to your local environment, you can also benefit from free parking for a year at all Cotswold Water Park Trust car parks (Neigh Bridge Country Park, Clayhill, Bridge, Lakeside, Waterhay and Riverside Park in Lechlade) and receive discounts at the Gateway Café, Cotswold Outdoor, Lakeside Restaurant and Jennies Kitchen.
