


Chairman's Letter 1/3

Update from - Hilary Collins and Fiona Galbraith

The Lower Mill Estate Landscape and Ecological Management 2017-2021, "the Ecology Plan", is a requirement of LME's planning consent. Under the guidance of Habitat First Group's Ecologist, the plan details the annual actions by the Estate Manager and his grounds crew to support and improve our wildlife habitats. The next iteration is currently going through a statutory approval process. Your committee has made suggestions to address noted deficiencies and we are looking forward to seeing the new document when it becomes available.

The plan also requires wildlife monitoring to be conducted as a measure of effectiveness of the plan and of overall impact of the development and we continue to press for greater visibility of these trends too.



LMEHA Rural Sub-Committee cont'd

Generally, we have been focussed on the following matters:

- regular clearance and maintenance of spillways
- adding culverts to prevent footpath flooding
- improving footpath signage
- balancing homeowner's requests to cut reeds with maintaining important nest sites for bird species in decline
- encouraging greater understanding and appreciation of the Estate's ecology by homeowners, agents, guests, young people and children, through a range of no and low-cost measure
- gaining greater clarity in the employment of the grounds team and ensuring that their activities are correctly ascribed to the service charge.

The rural subcommittee recently resumed a programme of quarterly meetings with the Estate Manager to re-establish an effective two-way flow of information.

WILDLIFE NEWS & UPDATE

Autumn is here, already offering some stunning sunrises and sunsets over the lakes. Such a wonderful time of year with lots of wildlife activity as our overwintering species arrive and our resident species are busy fattening up for winter. At this time of year the hedgerows are full of the berries and nuts providing wonderful colours and a great 'larder' for our birds and mammals.

Our summer breeding bird surveys recorded 19 different species definitely breeding on the Estate (not including waterbirds). There were another four species probably breeding too, giving us a total of 23 species with 187 territories (nest sites) between them. Strangely, this is more species and territories than were recorded last year when lockdown gave us a much quieter environment. On Swillbrook Lakes there were 19 different species recorded as breeding in 64 territories. As part of the Section 106 planning commitment we are required to monitor numbers of Reed warbler and Reed bunting separately to show that we are not having a negative impact on these species. Both these species rely on our reed beds for survival. This year we had territories of both of these lovely little birds throughout the inner Estate with Clearwater and Howells Mere being hotspots.



WILDLIFE NEWS - cont'd

On the wider Estate the southern and western ends of Somerford Lagoon were of most importance to both species.

Really excitingly a Bittern was spotted again over summer. These brilliant birds bred in the Cotswold Water Park for the first time last year. These birds suffered a huge decline due to loss of suitable reed bed from the 1970s onwards. Reeds and reed beds are vital habitats for so many bird and invertebrate species and managing them sensitively helps our wildlife and helps us meet our planning commitments. Everything crossed that Bittern will breed at Lower Mill one day soon.

As you will know COP26 is currently in full swing, highlighting the global ecological and climate crises. As the most nature depleted of the G7 countries, the UK has a long way to go to reverse the damage we have done over the years. We now need to do more than ever for nature as it underpins everything we rely on in our daily lives. At Lower Mill Estate we are doing what we can to help reverse this decline, while creating better places for people and wildlife.



WILDLIFE NEWS - cont'd

Since the last update, in a boost to nature recovery, all 177 lakes covering 2,000 hectares of the Cotswold Water Park (CWP) have been given Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) status. Natural England feel the CWP is a leading example of how people and nature can thrive together. This is a great boost for the CWP, Lower Mill Estate, and to the Nature Recovery Network.

Question -

"Swans seem to gather on Flagham Fen from Autumn onwards. Do they migrate here from somewhere else and then return, or are they here all year round and just not in groups?"

Answer -

The swans seen in large flocks at Lower Mill are Mute swans. These winter flocks are made up of those birds that are staying in their summer territories (i.e. those that breed at Lower Mill) being joined by other birds that have travelled short distances to join them. In very cold weather some Mute swans may migrate from Europe to the UK but they largely stay in the East of the country. Our flocks get together on Freeth Mere and Flagham Fen as we have a good supply of aquatic weed and invertebrates for them to feed on over winter.



WILDLIFE Question corner cont'd

Question -

"We took this photo a few weeks ago in Mill Lake. We think it's a crayfish but what type is it? And are they an invasive species on the estate?"

Answer –

This is an invasive Signal crayfish. This species was introduced to the UK for commercial purposes in the 1970s. It quickly escaped into our waters and is now widespread. Much larger than our native White-clawed crayfish they outcompeted them for food and habitat and also brought with them the crayfish plaque to which our native species are susceptible. There are now very few populations of the native species left in the UK, while the Signal crayfish proliferates and causes damage to our river banks through erosion and bank collapse.



WILDLIFE Question corner cont'd

The crayfish lay several hundred eggs which stay attached to the female. When the young hatch they remain attached to the female while they go through several moults, before becoming free swimming Photo shows female with eggs.

The good news is that our otters love eating these Signal crayfish so you will often find large red pieces of shell (carapace) in their spraint (droppings) if you're brave enough to have a close look.

We are also trapping these crayfish (under licence) to try and keep numbers down and they are being turned into delicious dishes in Ballihoo!

Homeowners Reviews – **Dragonfly Cafe**

Anyone who has explored the many trails of the Cotswold Water Park will know it's teaming with wildlife. However, have you ever noticed fish bones, including the vicious jaws of some large pike, or the disseminated remains of crayfish exoskeleton, scattered along the shores of the lakes or river banks, and wondered how these remains came about? The culprit is our native otter. These wonderful but elusive animals are making a steady comeback across the UK and are now common across the Cotswold Water Park — much to the frustration of the fishermen from the local angling clubs. We've all probably seen the odd otter in a zoo / animal sanctuary but how about in the wild? Well now is a chance to see one during your stay at LME.

A short walk from the estate is the **Dragonfly Café**, on the Lower Moor Farm Nature Reserve. (See map over). The café serves up delicious cakes and coffees on a decking overlooking Cottage Lake. If you arrive early you may be rewarded with the sight of a mother otter and her three kits frolicking in the lake in front of the café during the early morning mist rising off the lake.



New cycle routes

The six new on road cycle routes, funded by Gloucestershire C. Council's Growing Our Communities Fund are due to complete later this year. The proposed new routes covering a combined distance of 150km, together with a family activities trail on the Old Railway Line, are being waymarked mainly for proficient cyclists on quiet lanes and roads across the eastern and western sides of the CWP. Cyclists will be guided using downloadable maps, a series of way markers and/or a printed cycling guide.

Mobile information and education trailer

The Trust is delighted to have reached its funding target through Crowdfund Cotswolds for the mobile information and education trailer and would like to thank Cotswold District Council, Lower Mill Estate, Polydron, Relish Festive, Lake Pochard Management Co., 41 Mill Village and all the generous individuals who donated.
