

## Message from our LMEHA Chair


#### Welcome to our September 2022 Newsletter.

### LMEHA – Rural Sub-Committee

#### Rural subcommittee news

Thanks to much work accomplished by the grounds maintenance team over the summer, the rural estate has been looking especially lovely.

#### Things to report include:

- Picnic tables and seats have been replaced and repaired
- A herd of young male goats has been has begun grass maintenance duties at Pike Corner
- Wildflower seed collection, grass cutting and removal, successfully accomplished on Swillbrook Meadow
- Weir replacement at Mill Village is well underway



### LMEHA – Rural Sub-Committee

LMEHA Homeowner interest sought on two potential Spring 2023 projects.

#### House martin nest boxes

Having declined in the UK by 57% between 1969 and 2018, the once thriving house martin colonies have dwindled, and are completely lost in many locations. The bulk of declines have been found in England over the last 10-15 years; populations in Scotland and Northern Ireland appear to be faring better over the same period. It is due to this decline that in 2021 the house martin was reclassified as Red listed in the Birds of Conservation Concern report, putting it in the top division of birds we should be concerned about - RSPB.

Some areas of the estate have very few properties with house martin nests. Section 106 funding may be available to help fund the purchase and installation of additional house martin nest cups/nest boxes.

#### Purchasing LME approved plants

Many homeowners like to improve the planting around their properties but buying plants on the approved LME wildlife-friendly planting list (either locally or on-line) can be time-consuming and costly. LMEHA is researching a bulk wholesale purchase for homeowners, and/or other ways that approved plants can be sourced at lower cost.


## LMEHA -Nature Club

#### Latest updates -

- We've engaged with LME/HFG to synchronise with their own NetZero plans
- We have secured a free feasibility study for a heat network option from Kensa, that could replace the Calor gas heating. We will share the results of the study. Obviously, no decision will be made without full consultation.
- We have met with Scottish and Southern Electric, who provide the electricity network in our area to start planning for a community solar farm.
- We have quotes for a feasibility study for a solar farm(s) and are working with LMEHA, the parish council and Cotswold District Council to fund and progress this.
- The village of Somerford Keynes have joined the initiative with support of the Parish Council and several village homeowners joining the community energy champions group, who are progressing the planning.

### WILDLIFE NEWS

#### Autumn update from the HFG ecologist -

As we head into autumn and winter our visiting wintering waterbirds will start to arrive from colder climates. Last year saw an increase on the number of wintering waterbirds from the 2020 surveys, particularly Coot, Gadwall, Wigeon, and Goosander. Last year also saw the number of winter visiting Pochard at Lower Mill double. While this only took our Pochard total to four individuals, this was a positive finding for such a threatened bird. These lovely red-listed birds of conservation concern are now classified by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) as threatened with extinction globally so the small increase at the Estate is really good news.

Our Estate is also home to a range of gull species over winter. These can be seen in great numbers at any one time with over 3700 Herring gull, over 1900 Black-headed gull, and over 1400 Lesser black-backed gull recorded over the previous winter on gull counts. Other interesting birds to look for over the autumn/winter period include Great white egret, Little egret, Smew, Pintail, Marsh harrier, Mediterranean gull, Yellow-legged gull, and Water rail. This time of year is always really exciting.

Avian flu is still a big problem across the country and many colonies of seabirds have succumbed to it this year. If you happen upon a dead bird while on the Estate then please leave it where it is and report it straight away to the Estate office who will contact Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (Defra).



## WILDLIFE NEWS - cont'd

As always, from 1st October until the end of March, the footpath between Somerford Lagoon and Freeth Mere will be locked to help us minimise disturbance to wintering waterbirds. Not only is this a condition of the planning permission which allows Lower Mill to function, it is really important as wintering waterbirds are facing many threats from climate change to habitat loss. Please help us by not using this area for these few short months.

Question Corner - In each newsletter, this space will be used to answer a couple of your wildlife questions.

#### Question

"James Ponting, LME's new Assistant Ecologist has begun offering guided nature walks for children, and adults/families on a weekly basis. Will these walks continue to be offered in the autumn and winter. Are there any plans to offer separate walks for the LMEHA Nature Club, or owners in general?"

#### **Answer**

James's children's nature events and his wildlife walks have proved really popular with guests. James has been working on a series of events for LMEHA which will be shared shortly. Unfortunately no one was able to attend the 'Big Summer Bioblitz' he organised for LMEHA on August 20th. We will advertise his next events shortly so make sure to book early so you don't miss out.



## WILDLIFE NEWS - cont'd

#### Question

"Climate change is bringing us drier, hotter, sunnier summers. LME seems wonderful in the sunshine, but dry river beds, heating lakes, and rock hard soil must make life hard for wildlife. How is the wildlife at LME faring?"

#### **Answer**

The summer was a scorcher which led to incredibly low water levels in lakes and our rivers. Our summer bird surveys will show us how our birds did this year but it will be years of data required to show the impact of climate change on population trends on the Estate. It is thought that climate change is impacting the UK's migratory birds. Spring visitors arrived up to a month later than normal this year due to adverse weather conditions on migration. The storms they face are increasing in number and severity and many of the birds are not making it as far as the UK now. Wintering migrants come to the UK over winter as conditions are milder making food easier to find. However, these birds are also arriving in lower numbers in the UK as the winter weather conditions in their summer breeding grounds remain warmer than normal, with less need for them to fly to the UK. We will continue to keep an eye on our wildlife and adapt our conservation efforts as required.


